

For **over forty years**, the Child Parent Institute has been leading the fight against child abuse in Sonoma County. We not only treat victims of child abuse, but we also provide crucial services to families in our community to prevent it. **Our mission is to end child abuse and strengthen the health of children**, parents, and families in Sonoma County.

Last year we supported **6,316 Sonoma County children**, parents, and families with our programs -- more children than the students of Santa Rosa, Petaluma, and Analy High Schools combined.

ADVOCACY

The prevention of child maltreatment is a shared responsibility of the whole community.

Under the management of the Child Parent Institute, Prevent Child Abuse - Sonoma County (PCA-SC) works to establish an effective, cooperative and coordinated response to end child abuse. To achieve our mission, we do the following:

COUNSELING SERVICES

Childhood trauma can have a huge impact on our adult lives -- left unprocessed, it can shape who we become as parents. Addressing childhood trauma is essential to the wellness of our community, and it is the reason why we expanded our mental health services to serve all of Sonoma County -- children, youth, and now, parents.
